He was a native of Washington County, Georgia where he identified himself with the Order by joining Beekman Lodge No. 33 located in McDonough, Ga. He was admitted to the Grand Lodge of Georgia in 1852 where he was singled out as one eminently worthy of the greatest confidence and honor. At that very session he was made Chairman of the Executive Committee and at the close of the session elected Grand Representative. His fraternal career was interrupted briefly when the Civil War broke out and he proved himself on the battlefield as a gallant commander. When peace smiled upon our country, he cast his lot with Barnes Lodge No. 55 and re-appeared in the Grand Lodge in 1868 when he again was elected Grand Representative and served until his election as Deputy Grand Sire in 1878 and at the session held in Toronto, Canada in 1880, he was elected Grand Sire. In the Grand Lodge and in the Grand Encampment, he always declined to serve as Grand Master or Grand Patriarch.

He departed this life on June 9, 1886 who for over a quarter of a century illustrated American Odd Fellowship as few men have had either the ability or the opportunity to do so.
